I was told that when you say 'sanibonani' that you are also saying to the individual: 'I see all of you;' 'I acknowledge you;' 'I accept who you are;' 'I am ready to engage with you;' 'I embrace you.' As I listened to the various sentiments attached to just this one word in Zulu, I could not help but feel just how lacking the English language can be at times. In some contexts where English is the main means of communication, some people don't even have enough courtesy to say 'good morning' to another person.

One wonders when we even say these words, what do we really mean especially when the greeting is used and there is not even as much as an eye contact to the person(s) being addressed.

As I thought about this Zulu word, I wondered to myself, what other words or phrases, or even proverbs were diminished and/or cast aside in the process of colonization? How different would our present-day world be if there was a popularizing of words that came from these indigenous cultures where these words were and still are more than just words.

Could it be that the reconciliation and healing that we are so desperately looking for currently in our world might reside in the language and customs of people who have been made to think and feel as though their way of living is not progressive enough? What else can we discover about our human condition if we were to lean into the vocabulary of the thousands of non-western local languages?

Social media is a continued crisis, online abuse, we pray for their safety and protection, particularly as the children are having a long summer break and hope they can speak up about uncomfortable problems.

Thanks to Sr. Betty, Sr. Patricia and Sr. Evelyn always supporting with God's teaching.

Thanks to Br. Edwin, organising the steel band for Father's Day service, having them twice has been wonderful. It was a hands-on experience for the children to be taught on the steel pans.

We look forward to the junior church service on 27th July and the end of year reflection.

'THE WORLD' IN THE NEW TESTAMENT

Some reflections by Br. Donald following our Bible Studies

Dear friends,

I realise that I may have caused some difficulty at recent sessions of our weekly studies about the mentions of 'the world' in parts of the Bible. And I feel that I should explain myself.

Of course, the Bible we refer to are all translations into English from the original Greek. This language was used widely in the Roman empire in the days when the New Testament was compiled. The word translated as 'the world' was usually 'tos kosmos'.

'ton kosmon' is how it looked in The Gospel of John in the famous chapter 3 and verse 16: 'God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life'

This is where I wish to start this reflection.

In John 3:16, most people I think take the meaning of 'the world' here as the whole human race, including its defects. So I believe that God as the world's creator loves this world, but sent his son to save the world from its defects and their consequences. An example of those defects today would be human brutality and idolatry.

But it seems to me that this meaning is not held consistently in the New Testament.

So, for example, in the First Letter of John chapter 5 and verse 19, we read that 'the whole world is under the control of the evil one'. This is a true translation of the Greek, but could mean that 'the world' is out of the control of God and controlled by demonic powers. That is not my faith, nor what I see every day.

There certainly are alien powers about today that Christians should confront and seek to overcome. And these are not mythical, but are real and can be named. Like Zionism, among some Jews and Christians; and Jihadism, among some Muslims. And these do cause real damage to human life, even starvation or mass murder. They need to be exposed and, if possible, made illegal.

As I read the story and stories of Jesus, especially as recorded in the first three Gospels, I am struck by how much Jesus Christ expected his listeners and followers to embrace their freedom under God the Holy Spirit to do the generous and humane thing. This is what so rattled the religious lawyers among them, and led to his public murder 'under Pontius Pilate' the Roman governor.

My suspicion is that the change of tone about 'the world' as between John 3:16 and I John 5:19 came about as the Christians of the first century were becoming increasingly aware of the danger to them posed by the Roman Empire.

That Empire had developed into a religious institution requiring the utter devotion to its Caesar. In other words, it had become a totalitarian idol. As such, it was hostile to all other faiths, including the Jews and the Christians who believed in the God above all gods.

For the Christians, this might have suggested that a world dominated by Rome was viewed as 'under the control of the evil one'.

But under Christian influence, the Roman Empire eventually collapsed and democracy developed. So we live in a different context today. One in which we have more freedom to think and choose than those early Christians who had to be very brave indeed to follow Christ.

In my understanding, Jesus Christ looked to 'the world' to choose to be saved from its own defects by noticing and introducing his life-story of service and sacrifice into its very being. So 'the world', despite its gross defects, is – according to Jesus - redeemable.

It is not a lost cause, but holds within its soul the memory of the God the Father of us all. The Christians' job is therefore to remind the human race of its true nature and origins and choose to be redeemed by Christ.

That is why I became a minister and missioner of the gospel.
