

I firmly believe that part of our usual rearing as children growing up is learning to be kind. Some of us learnt that lesson more quickly than others. Yet even though we have all been taught about the values of being kind, it is fair to assume that those lessons always emphasized being kind to others. We would have been taught that expressions of kindness meant that we would be willing to share what we have with others who have less than we do.

Additionally, kindness was about being empathetic to the feelings of others.

It was about being considerate and patient with others. While we were being taught how to be kind, part of that lesson was also learning how to accept acts of kindness when they were being done for us. With that we eventually could distinguish those who were being kind or on the contrary being mean to us.

The benefits of kindness somehow became clearer as something to be given while at the same time to be received.

Unfortunately, over the course of our lives, we began to realize that though we may be kind to others, it is not a given that the same measure and expression of kindness will automatically be reciprocated. However, I believe that once the lessons of kindness have been taught, they are very difficult to unlearn.

But our FF for today is not about showing kindness to others which is central to our core values as being decent human beings.

Anyway, I am contacting you just in case you and your families and or members of your congregations would like to join. Participation in everything would be entirely voluntary so please don't think you would be bambozzled into anything. Anyway if you would like to join us we uswould love to have your company.

We would be staying in the **Brødremenighedens Hotel** in Christiansfeld – you can book direct or through **booking.com**. The hotel is not huge and it would be first come first served when it comes to rooms. The hotel is owned by the Church and is in the centre of Christiansfeld but it only has 18 bedrooms.

Looking at flights the best way to travel to Christiansfeld is via the airport nearest to Legoland – called Billund. It is also possible to travel to Christiansfeld by flying into Copenhagen but that airport is much further away from Christiansfeld.

LENT

Shove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday. What do you and your family do to recognise Shove Tuesday. Traditionally Stove Tuesday was the time to make and eat 'pancakes'. Having a feast on the things that you will be eating during the forty days of Lent, to prevent you throwing them away.

This year Lent starts on Wednesday 5th March 2025. The start of Lent is known as Ash Wednesday. Can I encourage you and your family to acknowledge Lent 2025, by doing something to draw you close to God or to help another person (for example random act of kindness). Lent is a period of forty days that many people use to fast. Doing without something that they enjoy. Pray about the action that you aim to take this year. Pray, asking God to help you.

3. Promoting collaboration throughout the Unity: With Moravians in all Spanish-speaking areas having the option to work from the same curriculum, we will be able to have cross-partner conversations beginning from a common framework. As different Provinces address issues in their own areas, this framework will allow us to identify commonalities that may allow for collaborative solutions. (In 2022, the ABWM brought leaders from all Spanish-speaking Moravian areas together for a Moravian Resources Conference. Through hearing the same presentations and receiving common Moravian resources in Spanish, leaders were able to identify topics where they had a shared experience or could learn from each other.)

Costs associated with this effort are listed below.

- 1. Staff time: ABWM and other members of the Unity will dedicate many hours to this effort on the organization and compilation of the curriculum.
- 2. Translation: It is important that materials are translated well for best use by students around the Unity.
- 3. Printing and distribution: Materials will be accessible online via PDF but many resources will also need to be printed and shipped. Thank you for your support of this Unity Prayer Day Offering, which will certainly support and equip the global ministry of our Moravian Unity.

After drawing upon existing resources as well as creating what is needed - then each province will be provided this curriculum for use in their educational programming. Translations of existing Moravian resources like the Church Order of the Unitas Fratrum, The Ground of the Unity, Our Moravian Treasures, Covenant for Christian Living, the Bishops' Handbook, and more will also 1 be provided. The goals of this effort are to better equip our clergy, to support our Moravian educational institutions, and to promote collaboration between different areas of the Unity.

- 1.**Equipping our clergy:** By providing a common curriculum, we will expand the tools our clergy have to educate themselves and their congregants. We will also remove one barrier to education for those who are far from an existing seminary and are interested in beginning new theological education efforts.
- 2. **Supporting our Moravian educational institutions:** By creating new curriculum and translating existing resources, we are removing some of the burden from our institutions, which are already working hard to educate our Moravian leadership. They will simply be able to receive the curriculum provided, adapt it as they see fit to meet the needs in their own areas, and use it in their courses.

Unity Prayer Day Offering 2025 Common Moravian Theological Curriculum in Spanish

Since our earliest days, the Unitas Fratrum has placed an emphasis on education, both vocational and theological.

Today, there are Moravian seminaries and theological training centers across the world. These institutions are central to our ministry as a Church because they train the leaders of our Unity and give them the knowledge needed to serve our Chief Elder in their respective cultural and political contexts.

Through this Unity Prayer Day Offering, the American Board of World Mission (ABWM) will work with the Unity Committee on Theology (UCOT) and Moravian leaders and educators worldwide to produce a common theological training curriculum that can be adapted and used throughout the Unity and starting specifically with our Spanish speaking partners.

This curriculum will include training in the Bible and Biblical Languages, Theology and Church History, and Pastoral Theology. Specific courses will be identified with the support of UCOT and other partners, but some example courses are listed below.

BIBLE STUDY12th FEBRUARY 2025. BACKGROUND.

Paul wrote this letter from Corinth less than one year after he had written 1st Thessalonians. He and his companions Timotheus and Silvanus had visited Thessalonica on Paul's second missionary journey. (Acts 7 vs 1-10). They established the church there but persecution forced Paul to leave suddenly. In this second chapter Paul moves on to address a specific issue related to the return of Jesus and the day of the Lord. Someone in the Thessalonian community had been spreading wrong information in Paul's name saying that God's final act of justice on human evil, the day of the Lord was upon them.

Paul therefore wrote 2 Thessalonians for three main reasons:

- 1. To reassure those terrified that the Lord had already come by correcting false teachings about the second coming; because this city had many pagan religions and cultural influences that challenged the Christian faith. (2 Thess. 2 vs 1-3,5)'
- 2. To strengthen the Thessalonians in the face of continuing persecution.

To deal with the problem of some of the church members refusing to earn their own living.
